

## New services and referral process



Sheffield Young Carers now offer the following services:

➔ **Support for young people** One year of respite and resilience building for children and young people aged 8 - 25 living in Sheffield who are:

- caring for someone in their family who has a physical illness, a mental illness or a disability *and/or*
- are affected by drug and alcohol issues in their family (this support was previously known as WAM)

This includes one-to-one and group support, advocacy, training, bridging into other specialist services, and school holiday activities/residential. All our services are free of charge. Further details [here](#).

➔ **Support for adults** being cared-for by a young carer in their family. This service includes one-to-one support, advocacy, group training opportunities, and social/peer support sessions, with the aim of reducing the impact of caring on their child.

➔ **The Young Carers Activity Fund:** A £300 fund for individual or groups of young carers aged up to 18 who don't want or can't access our service to get a break from their caring role.

**Referrals:** To refer a young person to our organisation, they must want and be involved in the referral. Young people/families can also self-refer. Full details and our new referral form are available [here](#). (Please note: We currently have a five month waiting list but are working through this as quickly as we can).

# Raising Awareness Around Extremism



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Remedi are very excited to be offering a new and unique workshop raising awareness around extremism.

Remedi is a charity organisation offering restorative justice services; working alongside local councils we also offer one to one and group sessions for young people.

We are offering an opportunity for your school to access the free 1 hour workshops, we feel it is important to empower young people to have the confidence to identify signs and report extremism when or if encountered in safe and responsible way.

We would ideally like to be in school on 2 consecutive days delivering 2-3 sessions each day to year groups 8, 9 and 10. This will enable us to reach a large majority of students and be available to offer additional support if needed.

## Session Aims

- To understand and raise awareness of extremism and identify ways in which young people can become vulnerable.
- To understand the risk factors.
- To understand the impact extremism has on victims, families and communities.
- To empower young people to have the confidence to identify signs and report extremism when encountered in a safe and responsible way.

# Passport Activity Newsletter

## Spring 2019

Welcome to our **Spring edition** of our Sheffield CU Passport Activity Newsletter. In here you'll find lots of activities taking place across the city in the school holidays – and if your child has a Passport to Learning, they'll be able to earn CU credits for taking part in all of them! Some of the activities are FREE while some will need to be paid for, and some require booking in advance. We would always recommend contacting the Learning Destination before making a special journey to join them, and you can find contact details of ALL of our Learning Destinations on the table at the back of this newsletter.

To collect these credits at these and other activities, children/young people must attend a SHEFFIELD school and they need a Passport to Learning. These cost £3.50 and are available to purchase at Sheffield libraries and some Learning Destinations. The credits lead to awards at these levels...

**30 credits – Bronze**

**65 credits – Silver**

**100 credits – Gold**

...and at those intervals up to 1000 hours, so 30 awards in total!

REMEMBER: to make sure you are awarded the credits you have earned, **the Learning Destinations in Sheffield MUST put your details on a register AND they send that register into us!** If they don't, we won't know where you have visited and can't award your credits, so make sure you ask for the CU register! It takes us a little time to input all the credits so thank you for your patience. **So, every time you visit a SHEFFIELD Learning Destination, remind them to keep a register AND send it into us!** Remember, if there's no register, it means no credits! If you visit a Learning Destination outside of Sheffield, you need to download a diary sheet from our website (or use the one attached to the back of this newsletter!) and send it in to make sure your credits are counted! - Put together your own character-based tour and try it out on real visitors to Abbeydale!
- Learn about how exhibitions are put together and have a go at writing your own labels for the objects around the site.
- Work in a team to design a craft activity for families that can be used in our “Make Your Own” holiday programme. You could even come back over the summer holidays to help us deliver the activity.
- Work together to put on a celebration event on the last day.



# Primary PE and Sport Premium for 2019/20



The Department for Education has today confirmed to us that it will fund the Primary PE and Sport Premium for the 2019/20 academic year.

A total of £320 million will again be made available to primary schools in England to improve the quality of PE and sport.

It is expected that further details will be published by the department soon.



**Responding to the update, YST Chief Executive Ali Oliver said:**

“It is good news that primary schools know the certainty over their PE and sport premium for the next academic year.

“This funding brings with it a huge amount of potential to improve children’s formative experiences of PE at primary school but it will be vital that it is spent in the right way. We want to see every primary school teacher professionally supported to develop young people’s physical literacy with the same skill and passion as language literacy and numeracy.

“With a School Sport Action Plan due to be published by government soon, we look forward to seeing a more long-term, joined up approach which reverses cuts to PE and maximises the potential of sport and play to improve children’s wellbeing and life chances.”

# Examples of what your school could pledge:



Sheffield are aiming for as many schools as possible to sign up for this to showcase our fantastic Schools network across the city and do all that we can to promote physical activity to our pupils. Are you hosting a Move More Day/ Week, introducing the Daily Mile, Increasing the amount of Active Lessons that take place in school, promoting activities to families or working with your inactive pupils to inspire them... ?

## Active Interventions

- Introduce Active Assemblies for the whole school to undertake physical activity
- Fitness activities introduced throughout the school day as well as personal activity challenges
- Ensure that pupil's have a range of physically active choices during interventions such as golden time/ children's choice

## Active Lessons

- Pledge that all teachers will deliver one active lesson per day
- Use of Maths of the Day (free resources), Active Literacy/ Active Phonics, Tagtiv8 Active Learning Games
- Use Standing Desks or ensure that chairs and desks are not used across a period of time.

## Active Environments

- Introduce temporary lines on to playgrounds to inspire a range of new activities.
- Utilise alternative areas of school to undertake teaching and learning (forest school areas, outdoor classroom spaces)

## Active Homework

- 4 week activity challenge- pupils have to record how active they are over a 4 week period- daily activity diary
- Activity Bingo- a Checklist of being active and pupils have to tick off when completed over a period of time- walk in the park, family swim, go on a bike ride etc.

## Active Travel

- Set homework task for walking/ cycling/ scooting to school and link to cross curricular opportunities (i.e. geography, maths, literacy)
- Introduce no parking zone around school for a period of time to encourage walking to school for parents/ families.
- Ensure that facilities at school are open to promoting active travel (i.e. bike shelter/ scooter storage)

## Community Links

- Visit areas in the local community where children/ young people can access opportunities to be physically active. Showcase opportunities to pupils and families in person.
- School could pledge to promote a number of local opportunities to families per week. These could be anything from local parks and opportunities, sports clubs or classes for parents to undertake. School could promote these through social media, newsletters or on school website.

Sheffield schools are eligible to one free place on the Primary courses, with a £100 per day bursary payable on completion. Further places cost £35 per day.

The GCSE courses are aimed at teachers without a post A-level qualification in computer science, and are free for eligible teachers plus a bursary of £440 per day (up to two courses).



# Handling conflict well...




**Project to produce a short video with a group of 15 students for whom training in conflict resolution skills might be beneficial.**

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## **MITA *Direct*: a course for school leaders**

MITA Direct is commissioned by a host organisation and delivered to schools locally. Host organisations include teaching school alliances, local authorities, multi-academy trusts, research schools, federations and clusters.

We deliver three half-day sessions, paced over two terms:

- **Session 1:** setting out the evidence on TA impact introducing the key principles of the MITA approach; conducting a self-evaluation; and setting a vision
- **Session 2:** using self-evaluation data; MITA principles in depth: what they look like in the classroom; practical strategies and ideas; action planning
- Session 3:** reviewing and sharing success and planning next steps.

Each school receives a comprehensive pack of high-quality resources and tools to support the processes of review and Implementation.

The cost of commissioning MITA *Direct*, for a maximum of 20 schools, is **£5,995**.

To get the most out of MITA *Direct*, we strongly recommend the Headteacher of each school attends each session, together with another member of the senior leadership team (i.e. 2 people per school should attend).
